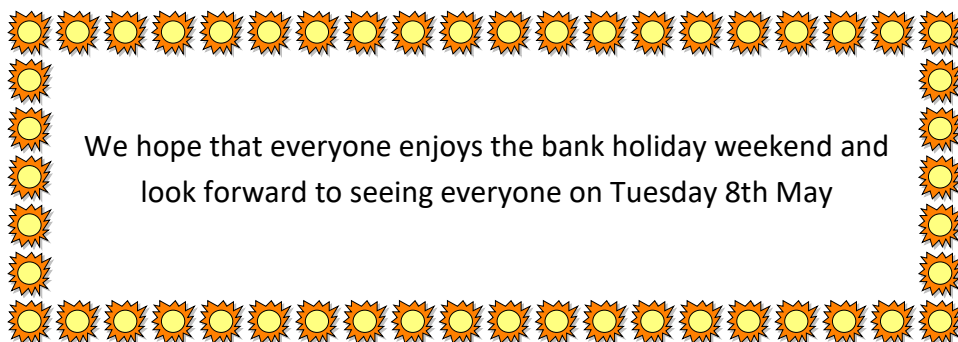

<i>What could school do better?</i>	<p>Roads and car park are terrible at school; please encourage the council to help make children safe.</p> <p>School have arranged meetings with the local authority and all parents have been invited to attend these for their say. Traffic surveys have been carried out and the local authority are taking action from these. The first action being making the zigzag markings on the road enforceable, meaning it is a criminal offence to park on these. We continue to hold meetings to drive forward improvements in this area. School also has plans to make the carpark safer for pedestrians. We continue to have staff out before school and at the end of the school day, as the children's safety is of paramount importance to us.</p> <p>Make friends so children understand.</p> <p>We work very hard at HJS to ensure children have friends and feel happy. The pastoral team, teachers and teaching assistants keep a close eye on children both in class and on the playground to monitor peer interaction. The pastoral team will talk to children who are struggling with friendships and put a plan in place to support them with this. The pastoral team also run a number of interventions based on friendship, such as Circle of Friends; this includes gathering a group of children together and looking at the qualities that make a good friend.</p>
